Description

The functions, obligations and responsibilities of municipalities have increased substantially over the last few decades. At the same time, the provincial government has undertaken a host of legislative initiatives, including a complete overhaul of the *Municipal Act*, designed to reform the roles of municipalities in Ontario. With change comes opportunity. The course surveys the field of municipal law, the changes and opportunities, and focuses particularly on legal issues that tend to arise for municipal officers, administrators and employees.

For the 50% Paper component, prepare a paper on a municipal law topic. You can choose a topic from the list of topics provided by the instructors or you can pick a municipal or land use theme of your choice.

For the 20% Participation component, students are expected to participate in class and demonstrate a good understanding of the course materials through their involvement with in class exercises, group work and class discussions.

For the 20% Presentation component, students will be placed in groups and each group will receive an assignment during the class on October 31, 2014. The groups will have time in class on November 1, 2014 to meet and discuss the assignment and review any questions they may have with the instructors. Each group will give a presentation on the assignment during regular class time on November 28, 2014. Each group is expected to present for approximately 20 minutes with an additional 5 minutes at the end to answer any questions or discuss any interesting points that may be raised during the presentation. Every member of the group is expected to participate in the presentation.

For the 10% Paper Outline component, students are expected to set out their topic for the paper and describe the components of their paper including the thesis for their paper and the areas of discussion that will be discussed as well as the position the student is taking with respect to the topic. A complete bibliography is not required, but students are expected to submit a list of the research materials reviewed in the preparation of their paper outline.
