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Course Information

Calendar Description: Drawing upon theories and research findings in public administration and management, this course examines administrative approaches, issues and debates arising in local governments in a changing environment. Students will learn how the complex and unstable environment of public sector organizations produces both challenges and opportunities for public sector managers, and will work through case material that requires them to apply insights from management and public administration literature to real-world local government settings.

Course objectives: This course provides an overview of selected research and issues in the field of local government management.

Course Organization: The course will consist of a combination of lectures, student debates, and class discussions

Readings and Materials: Students should obtain their own copy of the following book, which is available in the university bookstore:

All other assigned readings will be available through Western Libraries or the course's OWL site. Assigned reading should be done **<u>Before</u>** the class in which it is to be discussed.

Requirements

1. *Structured Debate*. You will be required to participate in at least one structured debate during class (depending upon numbers, students may be required to participate in two debates). I will post debate instructions and a sign-up sheet on OWL. Please e-mail me a ranked list of three propositions that you are interested in supporting by **Wednesday**, **May 27th at the latest**. I will assign propositions based on these lists and post a populated sign-up sheet on OWL the

following day. Each student will speak about their position for five to 10 minutes. Afterwards, the debate will be opened up to the rest of the class.

2. *Class Participation*. You must attend all classes, keep up with the readings, and participate during discussions. If you are unable to attend a particular class, you should advise the instructor in advance.

2. *In-class Assignment*. To be completed **on the morning of Friday, June 5th**. Further instructions will be given in class.

4. *Essay*. The final course requirement is an essay of about 2,500-3,000 words in length that is **due Friday, June 19**th. This essay may be related to any topic covered during the course. Further instructions and guidance will be given in class.

Note: Overdue submissions will be penalized **two percentage points** for each day (including weekends) that the paper is late. Extensions will be granted only in the event that written confirmation of any extenuating circumstances is provided.
